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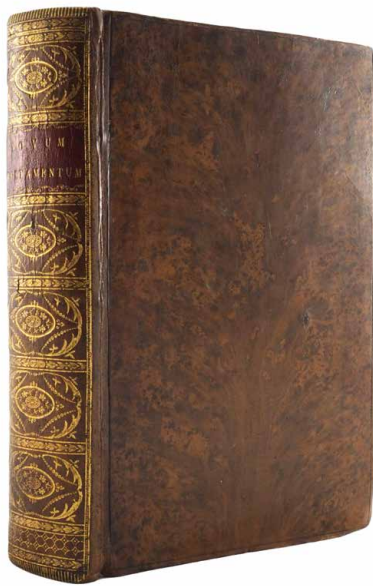

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1. (BIBLE. NEW TESTAMENT. GREEK). **Novum Testamentum. Juxta Exemplar Millianum. Typis Joannis Baskerville.** Oxonii [Oxford]: E Typographeo Clarendoniano, 1763.

8vo, pp. [iv], 676. Near-contemporary tree calf, spine elaborately gilt in compartments, red morocco label, marbled endpapers, edges yellow. Some light toning and spotting. Expertly rebaked (by Bernard Middleton) with old backstrip laid down, hinges relined. £650

An attractive copy. In 1758 Baskerville proposed the casting of a new set of Greek types to the Oxford University Press, and they ordered 2000 copies of this octavo New Testament (plus 500 in quarto) to be printed with the resulting type - which ended up being its only use. Negative critical reception may have contributed to its abandonment, but Baskerville's Greek face has recently been reassessed by Gerry Leonidas as an important predecessor of more modern types (if perhaps not quite as elegant as that used by the Foulis press) that had fallen afoul of an arbitrary typographic orthodoxy.



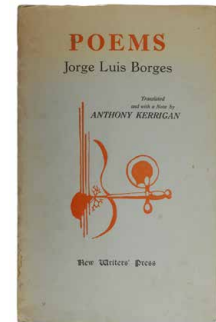

The collected works of Samuel Bochart (1599-1667), the influential biblical scholar who was the first in the West to quote from a number of Arabic sources. His primary publications are the Geographia Sacra (first published 1646), on Biblical geography, and the Hierozoicon (first published 1663), on Biblical zoology; both are rich in quotations and citations in Hebrew, Arabic, Syriac, Greek, and Ethiopic.

A scarce pamphlet, containing a selection that is 'arbitrary - but perhaps hazardously revealing' from the Borges poems previously translated by Anthony Kerrigan (published either in 'Personal Anthology' or 'Encounter'), hand-printed in a limited edition by the New Writers' Press in Kerrigan's native Dublin.

Extremities worn, head of spine partially defective, front joint cracked but sound. £75

The eighth edition of a satirical text first published in Latin in 1638 under the pseudonym Corymbaeus, the real author being Richard Brathwaite (1587-1673). 'It is a remarkable example of the trend for topographical writings in the 1630s, but in its rollicking style it also prefigures some of the picaresque novels of the eighteenth century' (ODNB).

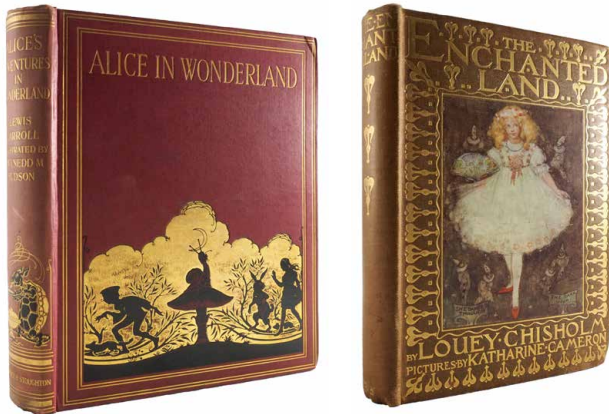
The first book by the South African poet Roy Campbell (1901-1957).

orange and black. Spine slightly sunned, faint discolouration to rear board, top corners gently bumped. £600

A very presentable copy of a scarce edition – the first issue, mis-spelling the author's name on the title-page.

Some pages unopened. Original pink pebble-grained cloth, boards blocked with decorative frames and borders in blind, spines blocked in gilt. Occasional minor spotting, a little heavier to initial leaves. Spines sunned, a little wear to joints and corners, somewhat more to spine ends, label removed from front pastedowns. £380

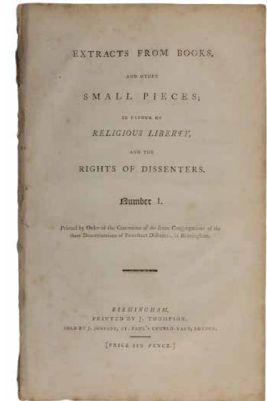
The engraved title-pages declare this the 'Ninth edition with new plates', but it isn't (that had appeared several decades earlier, with Ackermann's imprint). Nattali and Bond often published or offered remainders and disguised reprints at bargain prices; this copy contains a catalogue advertising books published, or sold, at very reduced prices by Nattali and Bond, including this title, marked down from £3.3s to £1.1s.6d, and the 1860 second Nicolas edition of Walton's *Compleat Angler*. That places the date of binding somewhere after 1860, but this is almost certainly the same sheets (apart from the printed title-pages) as those used for another Nattali and Bond issue where the printed title-pages are dated 1855. There is another title-page variant as well: most copies list 'eighty-one plates' - incorrectly - on at least one of the printed title-pages; this seems to occur in both dated and undated issues, though this one does not have the incorrect listing.

Two small collections of speeches, letters, and extracts relating to various Dissenting groups, published during an attempt to request repeal of the Corporation and Test Acts. The second number includes the text of a group letter to William Wilberforce as well as an address from the Quakers of Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, and the Western Parts of Maryland and Virginia to President Washington, along with Washington's reply.

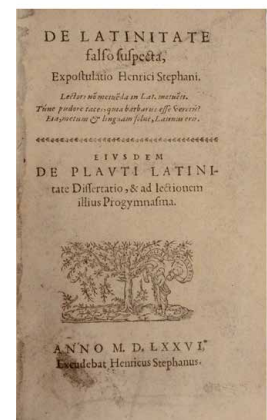

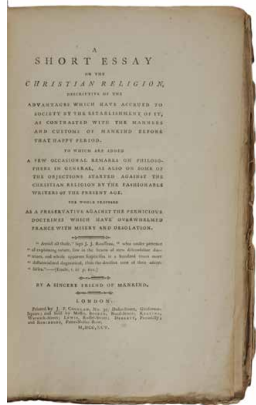

The first of three works Henri Estienne wrote attacking the cult of pure 'Ciceronianism' in Latin style, pointing out errors in the Nizolian argument for preserving Latin as Cicero wrote it. The more 'rustic' vocabulary of Plautus is held up as equally important. Since a number of specific words and phrases are discussed, an index would have been a useful supplement, but none was included. The early owner of this copy has attempted to make good this omission, completing a manuscript Table of Contents and starting an Index proper. However, he only proceeded as far as the title 'Index', then 'All words and phrases' and the heading 'A' - perhaps realising the scale of his task or the insufficient space on the two remaining binder's blanks.

A scarce essay by the Catholic apologist Francis Eyre (c.1732-1804), arguing first for the horrors of the conditions and morals of the pre-Christian ancient world (including the poor treatment of slaves) and secondly against the philosophy of Voltaire and (to a lesser extent) Rousseau along with the way the French Revolution treated Christians. Eyre also has more harsh words here for Gibbon, whose works he had addressed in two critical pamphlets which were his first published writings. ESTC locates copies in half a dozen UK locations, plus two in the USA and one in Australia.

Not in ESTC.

Though not a pretty copy, this is an exceptionally rare reissue of this pocket guide to farriery first published in 1790 (ESTC T65076) under the same imprint as this one. It was later reprinted by William Lane at the Minerva Press in 1794 and 1796. The reference to Taplin was just to encourage sales; the author may have read Taplin but he bears no other connection to the work. All editions are scarce, with the first located in just the BL and Science Museum by ESTC; this second is not in ESTC and Worldcat contains only one listing for it, at Texas A&M.

A rare provincial printing of Gay's fables - ESTC locates just three copies, BL, Oxford, and Cambridge.

A scarce continental printing of this long-time bestseller: ESTC locates just two copies in the UK (BL and Cambridge) and three in the USA (Huntington, NYAM, UPenn).

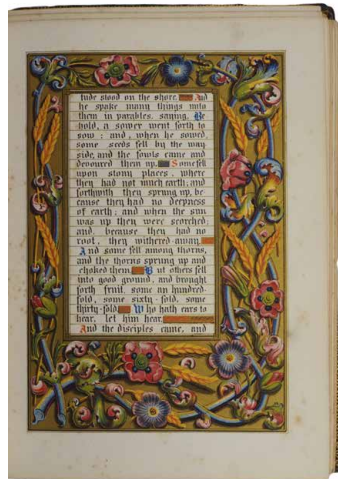

An early New Jersey printing - probably the first American, beating a Delaware printing of the same year - of the popular biography of Sarah Grubb (1756-1790), Quaker minister and educationalist.

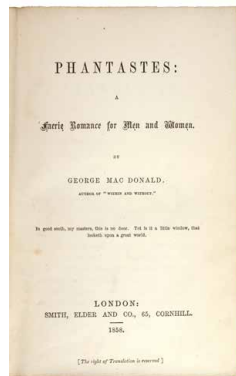

8vo, pp. [32], ii. *All but the final leaf with richly chromolithographed borders and text, alternating between black & gold and full colour with each spread. Original black papier-maché embossed boards, backed with black morocco, spine blocked in blind, edges gilt, marbled endpapers. The glue of the binding entirely perished and the leaves loose, spine somewhat rubbed, a few tiny cracks to boards. Gift inscription dated 1880 to binder's blank.* £350

As often, the gutta percha holding the leaves in has entirely dried out and the contents are loose, but all present; the papier-maché boards are in better-than-usual condition with no chips or loss, and the leather spine present and unrestored.

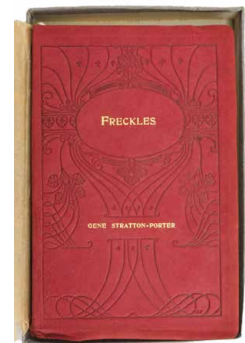
A substantial compilation by William Ralston Shedden-Ralston (1828-1889), librarian and Russian scholar of Scottish descent, which formed the source material for Arthur Rackham's 'Old Peter's Russian Tales'.

Early ownership inscription of Hannnah Thompson to front flyleaf.* £200

An early American printing of this important cookbook, first published in 1806 by John Murray, for whom it was a regular bestseller. The first American printing was Boston, 1807, and the second New York, 1814, of which this is the second edition. As a practical book, copies in nice shape are unusual, and it is particularly nice to have early provenance of an American woman.

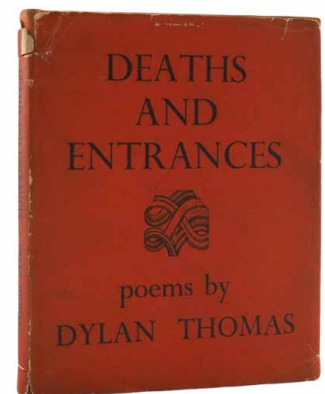

A remarkable survival in fine condition, complete with its original promotional box which is also remarkably well preserved. The novel was first published in the UK in 1905 and frequently reprinted, and adapted several times for the screen.

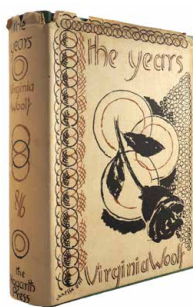

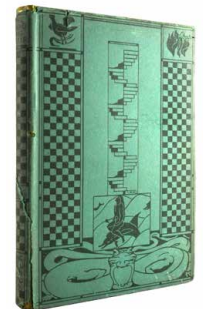

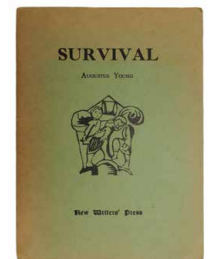
